

# *Awaken to Growth* **in the Spirit**

Growth is a key strategic objective in St. John the Divine's vision for the future. In our leadership's continuing strategic planning for the next five years, our working documents name this desire explicitly: "We want to be obedient to Christ's Great Commission to grow his church among all people (Matthew 28:19)." We are developing ministries to grow the numbers of new members joining our life in Christ as well as to grow the engagement level of current members who are not deeply involved.

For faithful believers, it may seem obvious that any church would want to develop strategies aimed at this kind of growth. Alas, that has not been my observation across the Christian landscape in the West. In many cases, challenges within and outside the life of a congregation dictate a focus on merely maintaining what is already happening. There are a multitude of churches that simply aim for survival. Thus, I am so grateful to belong to a Christ-centered, deeply loved, and vibrant parish that wants to share the life God has given us with others who do not experience it. We want to see growth.

However, I raise two important questions: what is growth, and how does it happen in the church? St. Paul famously reminded an expanding and diverse congregation in ancient Corinth that while leadership is obviously important, it is God who is responsible for growth: "Neither the one who plants, nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth" (1 Cor. 3:7). Eloquent and wise words are good things, of course. But the message of the gospel grows through the "demonstration of the Spirit and

of power" (1 Cor. 2:4). Jesus said it even more succinctly: "without me, you can do nothing" (John 15:5).

For St. John the Divine to live into the Lord's vision for our future, we need to rely less on our own power and more on God's power. And that is counterintuitive to a parish like ours, whose cultural history and current state are defined by much human activity. Indeed, our activist nature as a congregation is a large part of what makes SJD so special. This church never seems to stand still. We are a very busy place. We work very hard to secure a successful and growing parish.

I once heard the Christian leadership author and speaker, John Maxwell, say that the best place to conduct a job interview is at a cafeteria. An employer can quickly learn the job applicant's capacity to prioritize! Sometimes I wonder if SJD is a bit like a cafeteria: we offer an abundant buffet of ministries, but find it difficult to prioritize them. We do many things and do them well!

Still... do we hear the words of our Savior? "Without me you can do nothing." His lordship is our only priority. If he does not preside over our life together, it doesn't matter who else does. Now is the time to return to this priority more than ever if we are to see the growth we yearn for.

I am calling all members of St. John the Divine to a significant ministry in the life and history of our parish on the weekend of October 3-5, 2025. Please come and be a part of what we are calling **Awaken '25**, a church-wide, in-town weekend retreat



for spiritual awakening, renewal, and rededication for all ages and stages. It has been almost two decades since SJD came together for a parish renewal weekend. With other parish leaders, I sense now is the time again given all that we need to be praying over for the coming years. **Awaken '25** is not just a weekend event but a catalyst to awaken us anew to the Spirit and power of God that can “accomplish in us abundantly far more than we too seldom ask or imagine” (Ephesians 3:20).

You will be hearing and reading much more about **Awaken '25** in the coming weeks. I pray that in the years ahead, we will look back and say that this October gathering of the entire parish was one of the most significant movements of God in the entire history of SJD. What would have to happen for that to be said? Well, it's up to God. Our call is to show

up, surrender our busy schedules for one weekend, and be awake to whatever God may do, trusting entirely that Christ wants to bless us anew with his undying love in the power and presence of the Holy Spirit.

While we rightly hope to see expanding ministries, increasing membership, and burgeoning resources, the growth God cares most about is greater and greater awakening to the presence of Christ in the power of the Spirit. **Awaken '25** will be a unique opportunity for all of us to come together under that reality, under what we pray will be the Lord's outpouring. This growth is our priority in this vital season of parish life. And I earnestly desire to share the experience with all of you in early October.



## *Rector's* Fall Book Recommendation

***Waiting on God:  
A 31-Day Adventure into the Heart of God***

I discovered this slim devotional book a couple of years ago through the Greater Houston Prayer Community. Since then, I have often found myself recommending it to others. Andrew Murray (1828-1917) was a Scottish-born pastor, author, and missionary to South Africa whose extensive writings focus on the prayer-filled life. This book comprises 31 brief selections from his works. His writings are Scripture-based, practical, and inspiring. If you are looking for a good devotional resource for the fall season, I highly encourage you to get this book.



# *Resonating Faith:* The Létourneau Organ at 20

Twenty years ago, the birth of the grand Létourneau organ at St. John the Divine was part of an overall renovation of the worship space, which included acoustic improvements to enhance clarity and foster a sense of community in the spoken word, promote robust hymn singing, and support our choir program. Today, St. John the Divine is regarded as one of the finest acoustic spaces in the city. When an organ is built into the structure of a building, the room itself is considered the most important stop on the organ. Whereas our church building previously experienced a significant drop in sound energy from the front to the back, there is now very little loss, allowing for an immersive worship experience wherever one sits in the room. St. John the Divine's original organ and its chambers (the rooms which housed the pipes) suffered significant water damage over the years to the point that it made more sense to consider a new instrument instead of renovating the old one. Especially in conjunction with the renovation of the worship space, the significantly improved acoustics, and the burgeoning music program. In its design, we primarily needed a liturgical instrument that could faithfully accompany the traditional Anglican liturgy, the bedrock of our Anglican/Episcopal

tradition. The organ needed to accompany congregations both large and small and to be able to have a range of stops and colors soft enough to accompany a single child's voice up to that of a full orchestra or whole congregation on Easter with brass. Additionally, it needed to be able to play the majority of the organ literature faithfully. After traveling around the country to visit other organs, the organ committee selected the Létourneau company, a Canadian firm based outside of Montreal, to build our remarkable instrument, which features nearly 8,400 pipes. In August 2005, scores of volunteers, aided by scouts from Troup 55, formed an assembly line to help unload all the pipework and related equipment from the semi-trucks. We called the event "pass-a-pipe," and pipework was subsequently spread throughout the nave and on top of all the pews. After several months of installation and weeks of voicing, Peter Conte, the organist of the famed Wanamaker organ in Philadelphia, played the inaugural recital in 2006. Later that fall, the University of Houston Symphony Orchestra joined with organists John Gearhart and Steve Newberry to present two concerts of music for organ and orchestra, including Saint-Saëns' Organ Symphony. Many other artists have performed here throughout the years, including

Paul Jacobs, who appeared twice with ROCO. St. John the Divine also hosted the opening Eucharist in 2008 for the annual conference of the Association of Anglican Musicians. The organ was also a featured instrument for the 2016 biannual conference of the American Guild of Organists. Interestingly, when the Lutherans held their annual conference in Houston some years ago, they hosted their hymn festival at St. John Divine, featuring organist David Cherwien, due to our exceptional acoustics and organ.

The renovation of the space helped inspire the birth of ROCO and made it possible to offer choral and orchestra programs, such as the Christmas on the Boulevard

concerts. Over the years, the organ has inspired us in many ways: weekly worship, the great festivals of Christmas and Easter, countless weddings and funerals, concerts, and recordings by outside groups – not to mention playing for weekly St. John’s School chapels. The instrument is well-used and is a blessed treasure to St. John the Divine and to the greater Houston community.

As we celebrate the 20th anniversary of the grand Létourneau organ this September, we look back in appreciation to those who stepped out in faith, seeing the future of praise and worship to God that this amazing instrument has brought to the people of God at St. John the Divine.

**As part of our 20th anniversary celebration of the grand Létourneau organ, we welcome virtuoso organist Ken Cowen, who will offer a free concert on Saturday, September 20, at 5:00 pm. Ken is an associate professor of music at Rice University and one of North America’s finest concert organists. Praised for his dazzling artistry, impeccable technique, and imaginative programming by audiences and critics alike, he maintains a rigorous performing schedule that takes him to major concert venues and churches in America, Canada, Europe, and Asia. Admission is free, and we ask that you reserve tickets in advance.**

# Children: Sacred Gifts from God

God's Word consistently speaks of the value and blessing of children. From the very beginning, Scripture portrays them not as burdens, but as a heritage and reward. Jesus Himself welcomed little ones with open arms, saying, "Let the little children come to me... for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these" (Matthew 19:14).

Every smile, every curious question, every small hand reaching up for ours reminds us of this truth: children are gifts from God. They are not given to us to possess, but to steward. We are called to love them, teach them, and guide them in His ways.

As parents, grandparents, guardians, teachers, and members of the church family, we share a sacred responsibility. Raising children means more than meeting their physical needs—it means shepherding their souls. Children watch us closely, and they often learn more from what we model than from what we say. When we pray, forgive, serve, and worship, we show them what it looks like to walk with Jesus. And when we admit our mistakes and lean on God's grace, we teach them humility and dependence on Him.

Scripture gives us clear direction in this work. Deuteronomy 6:6–7 tells us: "These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on

your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up." In other words, teaching our children about God is not a once-a-week activity. It is a daily rhythm, woven into the ordinary moments of life.

We do not carry this calling alone. God equips us with wisdom, patience, and grace for the journey. And He places us in community—the church—so that no child is raised in isolation. Whether you are a parent or not, you have a role in shaping the faith of the next generation. A kind word, a helping hand, a listening ear—all of these reflect God's love to a child.

So let us cherish our children as the treasures they are. Let us pray for them, protect them, and invest in their lives. And above all, let us raise them to know that they are deeply loved—not only by us, but by the God who made them, knows them, and has a plan for their future.

### Pilgrimage to Tanzania

Neither my husband, George, nor I had ever been to Africa. When Bishop Given Gaula and his wife, the Reverend Lillian Gaula of Kondo, Tanzania, visited St. John the Divine in the Spring of 2024, we had the opportunity to spend time with them. Bishop Gaula invited us to “come see the people,” and we were hooked.

The Anglican Diocese of Kondo is located in a predominantly Muslim part of the country. In Tanzania, 70% of the population is Christian; however, the Diocese of Kondo is a missionary diocese reaching out to a mix of animists and Muslims. The Diocese has been under the leadership of Bishop Given since 2012.

The SJD team consisted of Leigh and Susalee Spruill, Libby Garfield, Anne Bike, Ted and Lori Gobillot, and George and Patricia Snyder. Our trip was a “pilgrimage” and not a “mission trip.” Bishop Given’s purpose for the invitation was to develop relationships and introduce his Diocese to the knowledge that they are part of a larger worldwide Christian community.

Nights in the hostel were delightfully cool, and each morning we were awakened by the Muslim call to prayer, accompanied by crowing roosters as the city came alive. The churches we visited gathered around a covering of

colorful sheets and blankets with plastic lawn chairs for the guests of honor. Foot tapping music was provided by drums, choirs, and a large boom box attached to a solar panel. Without electricity or running water, these generous congregations fed us local cuisine cooked over an open fire. During the visits to the churches, 107 baptisms took place, along with a blessing of the cattle and bomas at the Maasai church, accompanied by preaching and prayers. Interspersed between the baptisms and preaching were countless joyful songs and dances. On Pentecost Sunday, we participated in the ordination service for 13 new priests who had each spent the past year planting a church.

As an observer, guest, and prayer partner who could only smile and nod in Swahili, I was blessed to participate in the work of the Holy Spirit. Our first visit was to a Maasai church where we witnessed many people respond to the invitation for prayer. I was awed by the Spirit’s work as I saw several of the elderly Masai warriors in full regalia come up to humbly kneel for prayer. I could not know what the Holy Spirit said to them, but their hearts were full. This church was at the very end of a cattle path (really). That long, bumpy road convinced me that our Lord Jesus goes to the very ends of the earth to call his children to himself. What an honor it was to see another part of God’s kingdom, share meals, hold hands, and rejoice together because we serve the same gracious God.

**Please pray for this Diocese from October 12 to 19, when they will host 700 missionaries who will go out into the world to preach the good news and make disciples. The bishop is praying for 5,000 new disciples.**

# Mission Report:

## STORIES FROM OUR SUMMER MISSION TEAMS



### Bolivia Team

The summer 2025 pilgrimage to Bolivia was my fourth trip to visit Mission Amistad, having previously gone in 2018, 2019, and 2024 (2020-2023 were interrupted by pandemic travel restrictions). Each time I've made the trip, I return re-energized with the knowledge that the Holy Spirit is at work through so many people who are dedicated to nurturing some of His most vulnerable children.

Having made my first trip seven years ago, I've been blessed to see many of the children grow up at La Villa (the "neighborhood" created by Amistad to house the children and provide recreational, educational, spiritual, and administrative facilities for them). My return trips feel like visiting with distant family and watching in stop action as their children grow a little more each summer. Over the years, I've seen little ones in their first days at Amistad (often quiet and even fearful) grow into outgoing, risk-taking, smart, vivacious, and fully formed children who know that their "amigos" love them and, most importantly, that God loves them. The transformation is absolutely breathtaking and so worth the trip down each year.

The close friendships formed between the visitors and the children (and staff) are what attract me most to this ministry. Amistad means friendship in Spanish, and so the "job" of the visitors is nothing more (and nothing less) than to demonstrate God's kindness and love by showing up and being friendly to some children who, without Amistad, could very well go through their lives never experiencing what it means to be loved.

**In practice, what does this look like? What, exactly, do we DO when we go down there?**

We play (a lot) on the playground. We talk. We sit with them doing various arts and crafts. We take



them to visit the world's largest statue of Christ. We treat them to ice cream. We take them on outings to parks. We attend the Sunday service with them. We play pickleball with them. We take them to dinner. We pray for them, and with them, in daily chapel. We laugh. We cook hamburgers and have a picnic. We get to know their dreams and their frustrations.

**In short, we do what friends do.**

I shared in chapel during this trip that there are few places I've visited where the presence of the Holy Spirit is so plainly evident every single day. Being in His presence and sharing that experience with His children has been a transformative experience for me. A cobblestone path leads from the administration building to the various houses where the children reside at La Villa. Lining the sides of the path is a low rock retaining wall. Shade trees grow along the sides of the path. When I walk this path (often hand-in-hand with one of the children), I imagine Jesus sitting on the wall, shaded by the trees, with children scattered at his feet, laughing and telling stories to His kids. That's Amistad.

# Youth Blueprint Team

On this mission trip, we went to San Antonio to work with Blueprint Ministries. Blueprint Ministries is an organization that works with homeowners who desperately need home repairs but can't afford them. Their mission is to restore homes and restore hope by giving people accessible, dry, and safe places to live. This year, I served with SJD youth Faith, Carson, Grace, Wesley, Maksym, Joey, Matthew, Will, Lilah, Staples, Keira, and Abigayle. I was accompanied by youth leaders Ellie Kight, Collier Humphreys, Sutton Lowe, and Tony Brizuela. I already knew the youth attending with me because they all go to midweek, and I was excited to have the chance to deepen my relationships.

One of the most magical things about being on mission is seeing all the ways God moves through people. The way that stood out most to me was the work ethic of my team. Our roofing project was a lot bigger than we initially realized. Compared to the other group, we were less experienced and had fewer materials. We also had a long stretch where we had to redo at least two hours' worth of work after realizing we had made a mistake, which is a big deal when it's super hot, and we're getting tired. However, I could see God in the way that everyone persevered through these hardships. My team was slow to anger and quick to encourage; everyone looked out for and supported

each other. We literally lifted each other up so we could all finish the task at hand. I also saw God in the way that we connected with the other churches. We worshiped and played together, making new friendships and strengthening the ones we had. I could clearly see and feel God, because when you are among such a Christ-filled community, you get immediately washed over with a sense of belonging, and you know you are home.

It is hard to choose a specific memory that stands out as a highlight, as I have so many good ones. The high school girls and I found this abandoned room filled with mirrors that we used as a hideout, and we had many deep (theological) discussions in there. I also really loved spending time with the middle schoolers on our team. Especially on the bus ride back, I could tell that the future of the youth group is in good hands because they are all so fun and spirited. My favorite highlight was when Faith Crockett got Elizabeth Wade (who was serving as a Blueprint summer staff) to play "Church Clap" before worship one night, and everyone from all the churches who knew it raced to the front, and we all danced together.

My faith life would be different if I hadn't participated in mission teams. Missions have taught me what being a servant of the Lord truly looks like. Seeing the love, care, and faith from everyone involved in the mission communities is a life-changing experience. It gives me such a tangible feeling to take back with me and is a reminder to embody the Lord in all aspects of my life. Being on mission is the closest I have come to seeing the Lord in person, and it is almost impossible to doubt when you can see someone's miracle happening in real time. My faith life would also be extremely different because I would not be as close with my Christian community and sisters in Christ. These friendships that have been built on mission are some of the strongest in my life and are one of my most prized possessions. Being on a mission really opens your eyes to the power of Christ as well as shows you what it is like to truly be immersed in his path and in the faith.





One Midweek, when Sutton announced that the youth would have the opportunity to go on a mission trip to Costa Rica, I immediately texted my parents asking if I could sign up. Traveling has always been a dream of mine, and the chance to share God’s love with a new community truly excited me.

During our initial meetings before the trip, we learned all about Limón, including its history, culture, and the mission work that Christ Church Cathedral had already begun there. I remember sharing how excited I was with my twin sister, Sadie, and my close friends, Catherine and Vivian.

One of the most memorable moments for me was our first Sunday there, the day after we arrived. We woke up and went to church at St. Mark’s. We had been told that church in Costa Rica was different, sometimes lasting anywhere from two to five hours. I was nervous, imagining a long service entirely in Spanish. But as soon as we walked in, those nerves faded. We were greeted with wide smiles and warm handshakes as reggae worship music filled the church through the speakers.

As an acolyte back home, I’m used to a more structured procession, but this was completely different. People danced joyfully down the aisle, waving incense, completely immersed in praise. I couldn’t help but smile as I watched the pure joy on every face. To my surprise, the service was entirely in English and even included a surprise wedding when an elderly couple announced it was their anniversary. I remember walking out of that service stunned, telling my friends, “That was the best church service I’ve ever been to.” During announcements, Jarvis, who later became a good friend to our group, welcomed us by saying, “Once you walk into our church, you are no longer just guests. You are our family.”

Before the trip, our group spent time developing a mission statement, something we hoped to carry with us and reflect on throughout the trip. We eventually settled on: “One hope, one body.” After experiencing Costa



Rica, that statement has never felt truer. While I had gone in with the mindset that I would be the one helping others, it was the people around me who had the most impact on me. Through their selfless love and quiet acts of kindness, they changed me and even deepened my faith. Every day, whether we were painting, sanding walls, bending wire, digging holes, or mixing cement, the women from the town made us meals with love and care. Roger, our guide, always checked in on us, encouraging us and helping us practice our Spanish. Jonathan, a contractor who didn’t speak any English, would always give me a thumbs-up or flex his arms to encourage me when I felt like I couldn’t keep working under the blazing sun. When we spent time with the Costa Rican youth at the church’s high school, we shared meals and made new friendships, even with the language barrier. Despite all the boundaries and differences in how we worship or speak, one thing connected us deeply: love. I came into the trip expecting to make a difference in someone else’s life, but it was the people of Limón who made a difference in mine. Their perseverance, despite having far fewer resources than we do, and their determination to create a space where people can feel God’s presence and community inspired me every single day. God always loves first, and that truth was evident in everything we experienced on our trip.

Going forward, I will always cherish the memories from this incredible trip. Whether it was an ice cream run to Pops after a long day of work or rappelling down waterfalls, I loved every moment as I grew closer to my community at SJD, to people from another country, and to God. Because of this trip, I’ll always carry with me the reminder to always love first, to focus on what brings us together as one body, and not the things that might seem to set us apart.

As we come to the close of a meaningful summer, we want to offer our deepest thanks to all who participated in our *2025 Summer Outreach Drives* through the SJD Go Outreach Ministry. Your compassion and commitment have been a shining light in our city and beyond.

This summer, your support made a powerful impact through three key initiatives:

- **First Responders in Kerr County Supply Drive**  
Collected 720 fruit pouches, 560 beef sticks, 92 protein bars, 386 electrolyte packs, 840 body wipes, 36 cans of sunscreen, 14 face sunscreens, 17 sunburn gels, 10 shovels, 3 chainsaws, 36 two-way radios, and 15 extension cords.
- **Houston reVision Back to School Supply Drive**  
Collected 554 granola bars, 288 ramen soups, 56 mac & cheese cups, 20 applesauce packs, 10 oatmeal cups, 20 grits, 156 pairs of socks, 62 shirts, 4 belts, and 36 backpacks
- **Soles4Souls Shoe Drive**  
Collected 650 pairs of shoes

Thank you for continuing to be the hands and feet of Jesus through SJD Go Ministry. We are grateful for you and all the ways you give of yourselves in faith and love.


